

### **Your garden birdwatch**

A few weeks ago, the BTO (British Trust for Ornithology) published its garden birdwatch annual review for 2019. This review ranks the most commonly seen birds in gardens nationwide and as we approach high summer, it might be fun for you to compare this list with the birds you see in your garden. There will obviously be regional variations, for example we are more likely to see blackcaps in the south-west than those living further north. And seasonal variations, try finding a swallow in the winter! But compare the usual culprits – and watch out for the unusual ones as well. The ranked list for 2019 is at the end of this newsletter.

### **Pushy juveniles in the garden**

Further to the above, I am sure we can all recognise a speckly young robin who has not yet acquired its redbreast of fame. But can you recognise the immature goldfinch without its distinctive red face, or the immature bullfinch without its parent's dark cap? (Check out also the red cap on a young greater spotted woodpecker). With the breeding season reaching its peak, see if you can spot some of these young birds.

### **Bird health**

With us all now washing our hands so frequently, it is timely to remember the importance of giving our bird feeders a regular clean as well. Wash empty feeders with warm soapy water and if possible, move feeding sites from time to time, especially in dry weather. Viruses affect birds as well as people, greenfinch populations for example have been badly hit in recent years by a disease called trichomonosis, known to be spread by poor hygiene.

### **And finally – watch out, thief about**
